LIVING TOGETHER IN HARMONY WITH NATURE

Nature can live without man, but man cannot live without nature. Nature does us so much good, and we have the immense privilege of enjoying it in our municipality.

As citizens, we have a duty to care for, protect and maintain it. For some time now, however, we have noticed a certain lack of concern for the environment:

1. Debris around certain properties;
2. Expired permits on land when work is being carried out;
3. Rigid insulation blocks (usually blue), when this type of insulation is not permitted;
4. Plastic bags making a buoy line on Lac Manitou;
5. Boats moored in the middle of the lake instead of at the dock;
6. Compostable waste and bulky items on roadsides;

We remind you that it is your duty as a citizen to take good care of your property (house, land, boat, etc.). To this end, we would like to remind you of the procedure for disposing of your waste:

IMPORTANT – USE OF SEMI-SUBMERGED BINS AND CONTAINERS

SEMI-SUBMERGED BINS

It is becoming increasingly common for citizens to use our semi-defused bins as ecocentres. Our employees are then obliged to manually sort the contents of these bins, which is unacceptable.

We ask for your full cooperation in putting an end to these practices, and in taking all hazardous objects and waste to the ecocenter.

BLACK BINS

Black bins are used exclusively to dispose of ultimate waste, i.e. waste that has no potential for reuse, recycling or recovery. According to Recyc-Québec, only 5% of the waste generated constitutes ultimate waste.

Materials prohibited in the black bin

- Scrap from industrial and manufacturing operations;
- Radioactive waste;
- Manure and dead animals;
- Electrical and electronic equipment;
- Household hazardous waste (HHW)
- Earth;
- Toxic and biomedical waste;
- Soil and sand soaked with hydrocarbons;
- Sludge;
- Tires;
- - Recyclable materials;
- - Construction, renovation and demolition waste;
- - Concrete;
- - Carcasses;
- - Mining residues;
- - Pulp and paper or sawmill residues;
- - Green waste;
- - Furniture..

Please note that the black bin is now collected every two weeks.

We also remind you that the Municipality does not offer bulky waste collection. It is your responsibility to dispose of it responsibly.

BLUE BIN

Materials accepted in the blue bin

- Newspapers, circulars and magazines
- Miscellaneous paper, printer paper and leaflets
- Envelopes, paper bags
- Books without covers or bindings
- Telephone directories
- Cardboard rolls
- Flat and corrugated cardboard boxes
- Egg cartons
- Wrapping paper
- Gabletop containers (milk cartons, cream cartons, etc.)
- Aseptic containers (Tetra Pak type)
- Takeaway coffee glasses
- All plastic containers, bottles and wrappings bearing the Möbius strip and the number 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 or 7.
- Caps and lids
- Stretchy plastic bags and cling film (bundle bags and cling film in a well-tied bag)
- Food bottles and containers, any color
- Wine and beer bottles, returnable and non-returnable
- Tin cans
- Aluminum paper and plates
- Various beverage cans, returnable or non-returnable
- Caps and lids
- Small metal items (hangers in bundles, pots, cake pans, etc.)
- Nespresso metal coffee capsules (in the bag provided)



BROWN BIN

Materials accepted in the brown bin

- Fruits and vegetables
- Pasta
- Breads and cereals, flours and sugar
- Dairy products
- Sweets and confectionery
- Coffee (beans, grounds and filter)
- Crab and lobster shells
- Egg shells
- Nut shells
- Tea and herbal tea bags
- Meat, fish and bones
- Pet food
- Soiled paper plates or glasses
- Food-soiled cardboard (pizza, etc.)
- Soiled paper towels
- Soiled tissues and napkins
- Paper bags
- Parchment paper
- Dead leaves
- Garden waste
- Conifer needles
- Hedge clippings
- Weeds (except exotic and invasive plants)
- Grass
- Sawdust, bark, wood chips
- Small branches (less than 1 cm in diameter, unattached and no longer than 60 cm)
- Indoor plants
- Cold ashes - after 4 weeks
- Animal hair
- Small animal litter (cats, rabbits, hamsters), dog excrement (loose or in paper bags).
- Tobacco and cigarette paper

BULKY ITEMS

We would also like to remind you that the Municipality does not offer bulky waste collection. It is your responsibility to dispose of it responsibly.

CULVERT – DRIVEWAY - RECALL



We would like to remind you that your driveway culvert is entirely your responsibility. It's important to remember that you're responsible for cleaning the culvert, and that you should have it cleaned before winter so that the water runs off smoothly and ice doesn't form

ENVIRONMENT – TEMPORARY WINTER SHELTERS



Time flies! Cold weather will take us by storm in the next few months, and we'd like to remind you that a temporary winter shelter is permitted in all setbacks and the parking area, as stipulated in bylaw 2013-060 (administratively consolidated bylaw) sections 206 and 368, starting October 1. The shelter must be removed no later than May 1, 2025. .

ENVIRONMENT – SEPTIC TANK INSPECTION - REMINDER



CITIZEN'S OBLIGATION TO PROVIDE PROOF OF EMPTYING

The new regulation 2023-155 concerning the Management of septic installations came into force on June 20, 2023, and implies new standards and requirements for owners concerning the installation.

Septic system owners affected by this new regulation received an information notice at the beginning of 2024 and must produce, by September 30, the inspection report as required by bylaw 2023-155, which is available at the following link:

THE LOONS – SPECIAL REPORT

ENVIRONMENT

WHAT HAPPENS TO CANADA'S LOONS ?



When we say “loons”, we conjure up images of crystal-clear lakes echoing with the enchanting call of this beloved aquatic bird.

However, recent data indicate that it's a cry of distress that's required to save this iconic Canadian species.

Using four decades of data from the Canadian Lakes Loon Inventory, Birds Canada staff studied the effects of several perceived threats to loon productivity. To measure this productivity, the number of six-week-old young per pair of loons

was examined. To maintain healthy loon populations, productivity must exceed 0.48 six-week-old chicks per pair per year. If productivity drops below this threshold, loon populations could be in decline.

So how are Canada's loons faring according to this data? Well, not so good! Over the past 30 years, their productivity has declined at a rate of -1.4% per pair, per year. In the early 1990s, loons produced an average of 0.7 young per pair, per year. In recent years, pairs have produced an average of 0.55 young per year. We are getting dangerously close to the critical threshold of 0.48 young per pair per year.

While productivity declines have occurred across Canada, the rates of decline are not the same across the country. The biggest declines have been in the Atlantic provinces. Since the early 2000s, loon productivity has fallen to less than 0.48 young per pair, per year. While declines have occurred in British Columbia, Ontario and the Prairies, they are not as steep, and productivity has remained above the 0.48 young per pair threshold for

the majority of years. The outlook is a little more positive for Quebec loons - their productivity appears to be stable.

Let's take a look at some of the apparent risks facing the loon, and what the Canadian Loon Inventory has to say about them.



We know that shoreline development and boat traffic pose major problems for common loons. Natural shorelines provide nesting sites and keep predators away. Shoreline development often degrades nesting sites and attracts predators. Boats can injure and even kill young loons and adults, and the waves they produce can flood nests. Although shoreline development and boat traffic can greatly reduce the number of loon pairs on a lake, they are not the main threats to productivity.

EARLY SPRING TEMPERATURES

When it's colder in April, fewer chicks are produced. In warmer weather, couples produce more chicks. There



is a species of black fly that tends to feed on loon blood. Cold temperatures in April bring more black flies. These flies disturb the loons so much that some of them abandon their nests. While some pairs are able to re-establish a nest, others don't, which is detrimental to productivity. Colder springs can also delay thawing. Late thawing delays the return of loons and shortens the breeding season. Nevertheless, colder temperatures in April are not the main threat to loon productivity.

EAGLES AND CORMORANTS



According to the Canadian Loon Survey, eagles and cormorants do not have a negative effect on loon productivity. It was thought that eagles, which eat eggs and small loons, and cormorants, which compete with loons for fish, could harm the bird's productivity. But this is not the case. In fact, lakes with bald eagles and double-crested cormorants offer better breeding habitats for loons. Perhaps it's because eagles and cormorants are found near lakes with lots of fish, essential to the loon's diet.

In fact, it is the combination of the following three factors that has the greatest effect on loon productivity:

ACID RAIN

Acid rain harms loons in a number of ways. First, acid rain and toxic metals limit fish growth, reproduction and survival, which means there's less food for loons. Secondly, acidity is linked to an increase in mercury in the food chain.



Since loons are top predators, they are at greater risk of mercury toxicity if found on acidic lakes. The Canadian Loon Inventory supports this view. Surprisingly, Canada and the United States have greatly reduced (by up to 90%) the pollution that causes acid rain, and many Canadian lakes are no longer as acidic as they once were. And loons raise fewer young on more acidic lakes. Although we don't really

understand why, this phenomenon could be linked to mercury and climate change.

MERCURY



Mercury is released into the atmosphere mainly through the combustion of fossil fuels, and enters lakes. Loons with higher mercury levels are less productive. Adults with higher mercury levels are more lethargic and spend less time incubating their eggs and feeding their young. Juveniles in the same situation have weaker immune systems and are more vulnerable to predation. Loons suffer directly from high mercury levels, and when their prey of choice, yellow perch, has high mercury

concentrations, loon productivity suffers.

This phenomenon could be linked to mercury and climate change.

CLIMATE CHANGE



If forecasts of fluctuating water levels and rising lake temperatures are correct, climate change could exacerbate the problems posed to divers by acid rain and mercury. Lower water levels during droughts expose lake sediments to oxygen and, through various chemical reactions, increase acidity when water levels rise again. This in turn increases the activity of methylating bacteria and, consequently, mercury levels in fish and divers. In addition, rising water temperature also increases the activity of methylating bacteria, which in turn

increases mercury levels in fish and loons. Consequently - with the increasing frequency and magnitude of water level fluctuations and the persistence of rising water temperatures under the influence of climate change - we can expect loons to be repeatedly exposed to large quantities of mercury, and their productivity to continue to decline.

REVERSE THE TREND



These problems don't necessarily spell the end for this beloved bird. We still have time to reverse the trend. In Canada, there are an estimated 240,000 pairs of common loons, producing an average of more than 0.48 young per year. This is good news! We just need to make sure they stay above that threshold - and we all have a part to play in making that happen! How can we do it? Read on to find out how you can help:

- Create or improve your shoreline buffer zone - The strip of vegetation around your shoreline contributes to the health of your lake. A natural shoreline provides safe nesting places for loons and protects against erosion and runoff.
- Leave overhanging vegetation - Overhanging vegetation provides shade, cools the water temperature and provides important habitat for wildlife, including fish. Fish often feed and breed under overhanging vegetation. The foliage, twigs, fruit, flowers and even insects found on these plants represent an important food source for many species. And loons are likely to enjoy the best fish populations.
- Be a wise boater - Boat wakes can destroy loon nests, and the boats themselves can injure and kill the young and cause their separation from the parents. In Alberta, British Columbia, Manitoba, Ontario, Saskatchewan and Nova Scotia, boaters must observe posted speed limits of 10 km/h within 30 meters of shore, unless otherwise indicated.

Try to reduce your ecological footprint. By doing so, you'll help reduce the effects of acid rain, mercury and climate change on loon productivity.
